model Within specific sub domains of biology the utilization of mathematical models have had a long tradition such as the modeling done on electrophysiology by Hodgkin and Huxley in the 1950s However it is only in recent years with the arrival of the field known as systems biology that mathematical modeling has become more commonplace The somewhat slow adaptation of mathematical modeling in biology is partly due to historical differences in training and terminology as well as in a lack of awareness of showcases illustrating how modeling can make a difference or even be required for a correct analysis of the experimental data In this work I provide such showcases by demonstrating the universality and applicability of mathematical modeling and hypothesis testing in three disparate biological systems In Paper II we demonstrate how mathematical modeling is necessary for the correct interpretation and analysis of dominant negative inhibition data in insulin signaling in primary human adipocytes In Paper III we use modeling to determine transport rates across the nuclear membrane in yeast cells and we show how this technique is superior to traditional curve fitting methods.
