

The main areas covered are the sound system morphology syntax and aspects of lexical and constructional semantics Dictated by the polysynthetic structure of the language and the patterns of its use the principal focus of the work is the analysis of the verbal complex and the interaction between the verb and other constituents of the clause The analysis strike a balance between taking into consideration the
