economics as well as the work others have done to advance and extend his innovative perspective Determinants of Health explains how the economic choices people make influence health and health behaviors It begins with a section on the theoretical underpinnings and empirical results of Grossman's groundbreaking health economics model first introduced in the 1970s followed by essays on the relationship between health and schooling determinants of infant health with a special emphasis on public policies and programs and the economics of unhealthy behaviors Grossman treats health as a form of human capital He shows that public policies and programs that determine the price and availability of key inputs have critical effects on outcomes ranging from birth weight and infant mortality to cigarette smoking alcohol abuse illegal drug use and obesity Grossman's approach has led to a major stream of literature in the field sparking contributions by the world's leading health economists including Joseph Newhouse Jonathan Gruber Amy Finkelstein Michael Greenstone and David Cutler His clarity on the role that economics play in people s good and bad health choices is immensely valuable to the debate over how we legislate and spend on health The Economics of the Global Response to HIV/AIDS Markus Haacker, 2016-09-01 The global response to HIV AIDS has been a major aspect of global health and development policy over the last three decades The book illustrates the devastating health impacts of the epidemic with life expectancy in some countries falling to the lowest levels observed anywhere and the remarkable success of the global HIV AIDS response in reversing such extreme outcomes Concerns about the implications of HIV AIDS for economic development have played a role in motivating the global HIV AIDS response However evidence on the impacts of HIV AIDS on economic growth or poverty is weak and the magnitude and relevance of such economic effects appears trivial compared to the consequences for life and health Because of the success in extending access to treatment globally HIV AIDS has effectively transitioned into a chronic disease This means that HIV AIDS absorbs not only a substantial chunk of current global and national financial resources but that these spending needs are projected to persist over decades The costs of the HIV AIDS response thus resemble a long term financial liability shaped by past and current policies Relatedly the calculus of cost effectiveness of HIV AIDS interventions has changed People who become infected with HIV can now expect to not die because of AIDS at the same time each HIV infection results in medical needs and expenditures extending over decades The book presents a framework for integrating these financial consequences and the transmission dynamics of HIV in the analysis of cost effectiveness of HIV AIDS interventions and in the Variation in Health Care Spending Institute of Medicine, Board on Health Care design of HIV AIDS programs Services, Committee on Geographic Variation in Health Care Spending and Promotion of High-Value Care, 2013-11-01 Health care in the United States is more expensive than in other developed countries costing 2.7 trillion in 2011 or 17.9 percent of the national gross domestic product Increasing costs strain budgets at all levels of government and threaten the solvency of Medicare the nation's largest health insurer At the same time despite advances in biomedical science medicine and public health health care quality remains inconsistent In fact underuse misuse and overuse of various services often put patients in

danger Many efforts to improve this situation are focused on Medicare which mainly pays practitioners on a fee for service basis and hospitals on a diagnoses related group basis which is a fee for a group of services related to a particular diagnosis Research has long shown that Medicare spending varies greatly in different regions of the country even when expenditures are adjusted for variation in the costs of doing business meaning that certain regions have much higher volume and or intensity of services than others Further regions that deliver more services do not appear to achieve better health outcomes than those that deliver less Variation in Health Care Spending investigates geographic variation in health care spending and quality for Medicare beneficiaries as well as other populations and analyzes Medicare payment policies that could encourage high value care This report concludes that regional differences in Medicare and commercial health care spending and use are real and persist over time Furthermore there is much variation within geographic areas no matter how broadly or narrowly these areas are defined The report recommends against adoption of a geographically based value index for Medicare payments because the majority of health care decisions are made at the provider or health care organization level not by geographic units Rather to promote high value services from all providers Medicare and Medicaid Services should continue to test payment reforms that offer incentives to providers to share clinical data coordinate patient care and assume some financial risk for the care of their patients Medicare covers more than 47 million Americans including 39 million people age 65 and older and 8 million people with disabilities Medicare payment reform has the potential to improve health promote efficiency in the U S health care system and reorient competition in the health care market around the value of services rather than the volume of services provided The recommendations of Variation in Health Care Spending are designed to help Medicare and Medicaid Services encourage providers to efficiently manage the full range of care for their patients thereby increasing the value of health care in the United States Informing Public Policy Stefanie Haeffele, Abigail R.
