emphasis on the two way primarily nonverbal interaction that takes place between mother and infant and the nature of the learning processes that occur in both the infant and the mother The reader is then introduced to a concept known as social referencing or the use of emotional information gained from another person to help evaluate situations Subsequent chapters focus on individual differences in emotional expressions observed in one year old infants Piaget's theory of cognitive development and its implications for a theory of emotions emotional sequences and consequences and the relationship between attachment and separation processes in infancy The final chapter integrates an epigenetic view of emotions with psychoanalytic concepts This book will be of interest to child psychologists
